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CHA bids adieu to more than 200 collegebound freshmen at 15th annual Take Flight College Send-Off

CHICAGO (Aug. 6, 2025) - Nearly 70 schools locally and from across the country were represented Tuesday at the Chicago Housing Authority's Take Flight College Send-Off – the largest turnout in the event's 15-year history with 210 incoming freshman being provided a fond farewell at Malcolm X College days before leaving for college.

Students received words of encouragement and parting gifts, as they embark on the next chapter.

"College is an important step in your life and CHA and our partners are working in concert to make sure you are successful," said Mary Howard, CHA's Chief Resident Services and Administrative Officer. "I know that the hard work happens when you walk away from here and roll up your sleeves to get the job done. This is just the start of your journey and we will continue to offer you support every step of the way."

Among the Take Flight participants was Ranye Holmes who, along with his mother Winter Morris, have made a formidable team over the years.

"My Mom had me pretty young. She raised me – but we kind of raised each other," Ranye said. "We've been through it all, from shelters and everything – just getting through life together."

Now they're on the brink of a dream. He is closing in on the possibility of attending his dream school, Morehouse College.

Ranye missed one day of school throughout his entire elementary, junior high and Kenwood Academy High School career. Morris says she thanks God for her son "multiple times a day." And she's doing everything in her power to make sure he doesn't go through some of the things in life that she did.

"Morehouse was his number one choice. We went in April, and he fell in love," she said. "He is very determined to get to this school, and I'm trying to see if I can get a second job now. He would be the first person in our family to do something like go to an HBCU or a good college. I'm trying my best to get him there."
