Programs & Services for What Matters Most

Our Mission: CHA's Resident Services Division works to increase the quality of life of all residents and support those on a pathway towards economic power.

FamilyWorks

- The FamilyWorks program helps connects family public housing residents with resources to support your goals. Families can get help with goal setting, coaching, and referrals to important services like child care, health care, and youth programs.
- CHA's **Service Coordination Specialists** provide services to residents living in **scattered site** and mixed-income properties.
- FamilyWorks providers and Service Coordination Specialists can also assist with any **lease** compliance challenges residents may face.

Senior Services

- Residents in senior housing can contact their Resident Service Coordinator to learn about programs, services, and community events.
- For seniors, the <u>Golden Diners Program</u> provides a healthy meal each day and the chance to enjoy the company of friends.

Community Ambassador Programs

- Residents in family and senior housing can engage in meaningful community service in their building and earn a monthly rent credit of up to \$100 each month.
- **Community Ambassadors** play an important role by checking in on residents' well-being, encouraging participation in services and activities, distributing flyers, and assisting with events.

Resident Representation

- Public housing residents living in traditional family developments, including senior designated buildings, are represented by elected resident leaders that form Local Advisory Councils (LACs) and the <u>Central Advisory Council (CAC)</u>.
- Public housing residents living in mixed-income developments are represented by an Ombudsman.



Support Your Education

Resident Services has programs and partnerships that can help both youth and adults advance their education.

Ready to take your education to the next level?

- Attend one of the City Colleges of Chicago at little to no cost. Through the <u>Partners in Education</u> program, CHA residents can enroll in a certificate or degree program at the City Colleges of Chicago for no cost after financial aid is applied.
- Apply for the CHA Scholarship. CHA awards <u>scholarships of \$2,000</u> to residents attending post-secondary education. Applications are open from mid-January to mid-May.

Did you know? For the 2024-2025 school year, **180 CHA residents** were given \$2,000 scholarships toward their post-secondary education.

- Learn how to apply for college. Public housing residents can contact their <u>FamilyWorks</u> <u>provider</u> for help with college applications, including applying for financial aid. HCV residents can email <u>education@thecha.org</u> for assistance.
- Join the SOAR program. CHA youth or young adults, ages 14-24, can get free, one-on-one support from our Education Program Specialists to help you plan for life after high school. Call (312) 786-3409 or email education@thecha.org to connect with an Education Specialist and take the first step toward your future success!

- Find year-round youth programs. Public housing residents can contact their <u>FamilyWorks</u> <u>provider</u> for help finding youth programs offered by CHA or its partners. HCV youth can email <u>youthopportunities@thecha.org</u> or call (312) 786-6930.
- Find an early learning program. Anyone in Chicago can go to chicagoearlylearning.org to find information on early learning programs.
- Find summer employment opportunities. CHA's <u>paid summer programs</u> give young people a chance to work and earn money for six to eight weeks. It usually starts in June and goes until early August. Participants can work up to 20 hours each week.
- Get a Chicago Park District membership. CHA teams up with the Chicago Park District to <u>give</u> <u>memberships to CHA residents</u> ages 6-12. Park memberships allow CHA residents to join programs at low to no cost.

Increasing **Economic Power**

Workforce Opportunity Resource Center (WORC)

WORC offers technical assistance, workforce development, and support for resident-owned businesses through a variety of programs and services:

Residents who need help developing their career can connect with WORC to be referred to jobs, trades, and apprenticeships.

- <u>Employment Placement Services</u> assists residents with resume building, interview skills, and
 job placement.
- WORC supports career pathways training in high-demand fields, such as solar/energy, healthcare, and food service. Certain training programs even offer wages or stipends to participants. Sign up for a <u>WORC information session</u> to learn more.

<u>The WORC Business Academy</u> is a program that helps CHA residents start or grow their own business. The academy offers a 12-week program where participants learn important skills like how to plan a business, understand finances, and market their products.

Paths to Homeownership

CHA's HOME (Home Ownership Made Easy) program makes it easier to buy your own home with two helpful options:

- 1. <u>The Choose to Own Homeownership Program (CTO)</u> allows qualifying Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) and Public Housing families to use their housing subsidy to purchase a home. Participants receive monthly assistance to help with part of their mortgage payments for up to 15 years (up to 30 years for head of households who are elderly or disabled).
- 2. <u>The Down Payment Assistance Program (DPA)</u> helps families with upfront costs of buying a home. CHA residents are eligible for a \$20,000 grant. CHA residents who receive a grant will be transitioned off of their subsidy.



LevelUp

LevelUp helps residents achieve financial stability while working towards their educational, professional, and personal goals.

- The program is designed to assist participants on a personalized path toward economic independence and overall well-being.
- When participants meet their goals, CHA deposits money in a CHA-managed savings account.
 Once participants graduate from the program, they receive the full balance of their savings account.
- People usually spend 3 to 5 years in the program, but you may stay longer if you need more time to finish your goals.

Did you know? In 2024, **80 LevelUp graduates** received an **average payout of \$7,303!** These payouts can be used towards a down payment on a home, going back to school, building savings, and more.

Health, Wellness, and Food Security

- HCV residents who have been <u>victims of violent crimes or trauma</u> may call (312) 935-2600 to be connected with a designated VAWA housing specialist.

Want to learn about moving to a new neighborhood?

- Enroll in the Mobility Counseling Program. HCV families can learn about finding housing in a neighborhood that may give your family access to better opportunities.

Find food programs:

- <u>CHA's Summer Food Service Program</u> offers FREE breakfast and lunch during the summer. All summer meals are FREE for kids 18 and younger and for young adults 18-21 with a mental or physical disability. This program usually runs from mid-June to the end of August.
